

Open 2018 talk, with comments



Very pleased to be at Open 2018. Lots of friends, old and new. Like me, working on building a collaborative sustainable society. How many of you is this true for? (POLL – Thumbs up or down please)
What might this larger vision be like? Where do we agree? Three more POLLS to come to see where those here agree or not.



We are part of a broad movement: Environment, localisation, social justice, economic democracy, human rights, equality, much more. For me what unites us is our unifying values: caring for people and planet.



(see slide build) 1 About relationship: cooperation not competing in the market, 2 Wellbeing: driving force of society, replacing money and power as the driving force.

Here's a potential project that gives a sense of how a global collaborative sustainable society could grow within the current society.

What does a social vision that embodies these values look like?
What does it mean to have a cooperative society, from local to global that isn't a top down hierarchy, 'self-governance' not 'global government'?

I'll tell you a fictional story, that describes what it might be like, and we'll see how much we agree or not on its structure.

Imagine: The Open Coop recruits 100 local communities, world-wide, for a five year pilot project to build collaborative, sustainable local economies on platform coops. And, all are connected to provide mutual support.



It also recruits businesses that share the same values who can see that they are supporting the growth of a (cooperative) market in which they have a strong advantage. That includes local businesses in each of the 100 communities too.

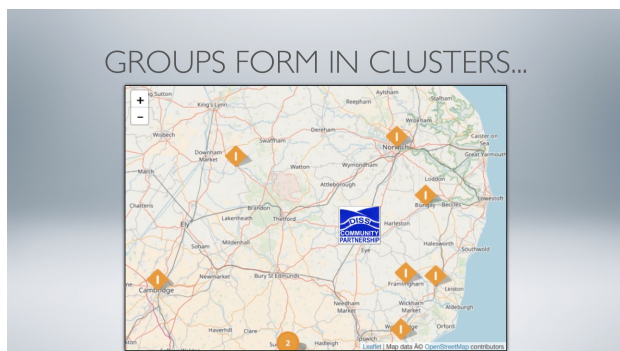


What might this look like at the local level? Of course, they would all be different, but would probably all be something like this: Locally it would be a network of coops and businesses, all independent but cooperating with each other, like in Emilia Romagna in Italy.

First: the 'Connectors' to pull it together over the 5 years. Also, from the start, the 'Geek Squad', a new local business to set up the technical infrastructure: the HOLO hosting, and the platform coops, building over the 5 years.

Other groups would come along as they can. 'Fun Squad' for events at which people meet face to face, 'Care Squad' for all kinds of social care, 'Peacemakers' for handling conflicts and maintain group harmony, etc All independent and autonomous, but with lots of mutual support to build synergy.



But the local Open Coops would not form and develop in isolation. That would be hugely difficult. Rather, they would be recruited in clusters for mutual development and support. I think in terms of my town, Diss in Norfolk and the neighbouring Transition Towns that would be likely to join if they could see the power of this vision, with its mutual support.



The same principle applies to the cluster as within it. All are independent and autonomous but working together for mutual support and synergy.



And again, the same applies at larger scales too. Clusters of communities working together for mutual support and synergy, so that the whole global network is connected, all learning from each other, all helping each other, while remaining autonomous.



This kind of multi-level structure is the pattern for a global collaborative society, with autonomous groups at every level, but also with mutual support and synergy between them. This approach to a large scale, bottom-up, self-governing structure builds on ideas of commons, peer-to-peer, viable systems, sociocracy, etc. At all levels, groups retain control,

but work together. (VOTE: Is this how you see a global collaborative society?)

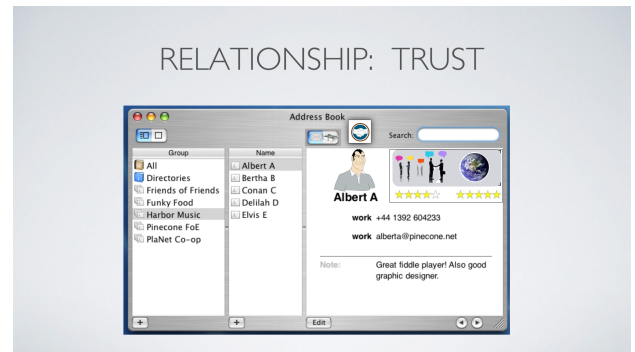


Now for the final section: This is a conference on Platform Coops and we started with the idea that they are a critical part of the infrastructure for the local collaborative, sustainable community vision I have been describing. So... what does this say about the starting points for those platform cooperatives? What do we need for the initial software?



I see the software starting points – before and during the development of the different groups in each local community – as covering two areas:

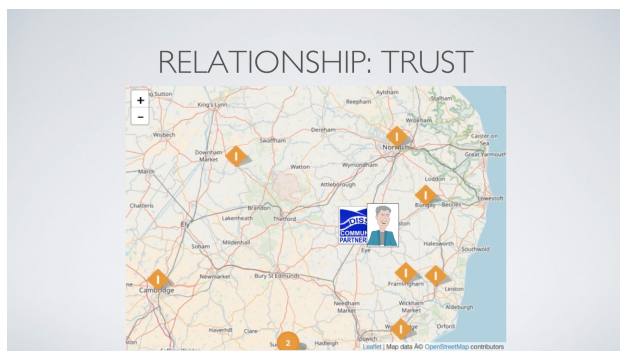
- 1 A social network based around relationships of trust, and steered by reputation.
- 2 A local exchange system in which people use money, but also freely exchange favours with people they trust (i.e. A gift economy).



(Sorry that I'm not very good at user interface design.)

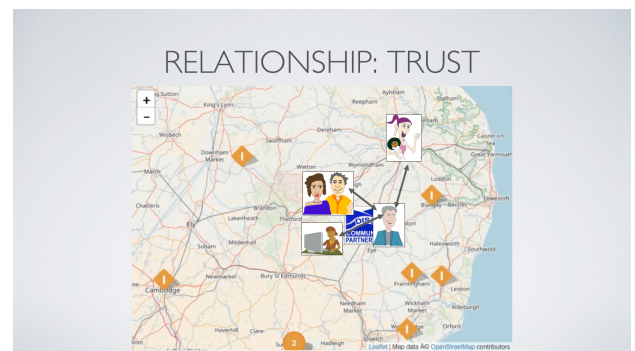
Here's an address book, or community directory with trust and reputation included.

What happens when I press the trust button for **Albert A**? What is a trust network?



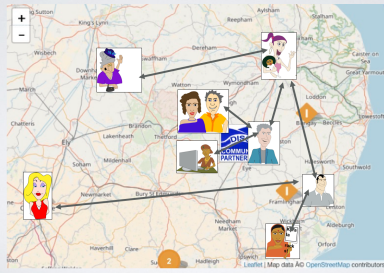
How do we set up a network of trust?

When I join the local open coop, I do so with people I trust, and mark them as such.



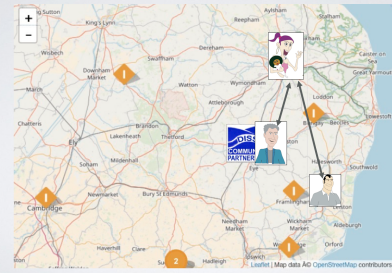
The people I trust also join with others that they trust.

RELATIONSHIP: TRUST



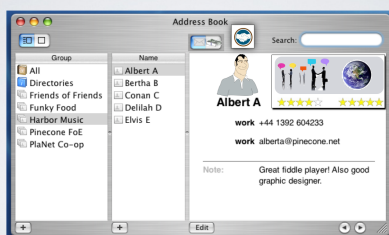
And so it fills out rapidly. I find there are many people who are trusted by those I trust, and so on. There is no-one who is anonymous, there are no trolls. Now what happens when I hit the trust button for Albert?

It shows me that he's linked to me through Sarah.

RELATIONSHIP: REPUTATION

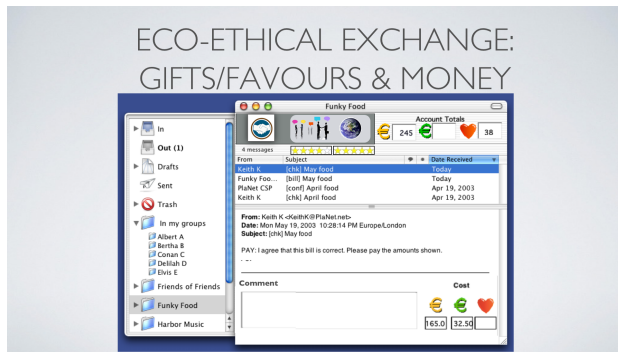


Now let's look at reputation. People are now very used to online reputation and use it extensively. eBay found very early that it needed to build in reputation.

I am proposing not just a generalised, vague sense of reputation. Rather it goes back to the basic values: reputation for serving people and planet, rated separately. For businesses as well

as individuals.

I see this as the most important point of this talk. This is the mechanism for toppling money and power as the social driving force! Anyone can have a good reputation. Good reputation needs to replace wealth as a personal goal.



And now to put this together with an exchange system.
 This exchange app: (you can do a better design, I'm sure) includes trust and reputation.
 It offers a choice of exchange as a gift or favour, or for a choice of national or local currencies.
 And that's it, the whole vision, as far as I can express it in 10 minutes.



Now for our final vote: I'm curious to see how much agreement there is on this. Do you agree that for this infrastructure for a collaborative, sustainable community we need a social network with trust? With reputation for serving people and planet? An exchange system that includes gifts/favours as well as money? I hope this will inform our future discussions.
